








BC's Emissions Profile






Direct Recirculation of Revenue Breakdown Back to the Local Economy




Direct Local Recirculation from a Procurement Contract




Visual Representation of Mills Basics






Visual Representation of Staples or OfficeMax Contribution to Local Jobs



Economic Impacts of Ferry Boat Construction

- 1063 jobs EVERY year of the 3 year build
- An additional 135 jobs in BC for every 100 jobs created in the shipyards
- \$378.5 Million in GDP
- \$200 Million increase in personal disposable income
- Production multiplier of 1.5....every \$1 spent on the ferries would generate another \$.50 for the economy
- \$102 Million more funds for senior levels for the Province and the Federal Government
